Commander's Intent

The intent of the second ILP seminar is to engage the leadership of the Investigations Branch with the particular business processes required to advance intelligence-led policing within the NJSP Intelligence Section. To do this we will utilize a variety of speakers and presentation formats. Dr. Jerry Ratcliffe will explain the theoretical model of strategic intelligence, and how it relates to tactical operations. Dean Baratta will summarize the NJSP's intelligence planning and direction process, reinforcing the key elements he described in an earlier presentation. Sam Brinkley will facilitate two interactive sessions. The first will focus on round tabling the processes that Dean Baratta described in his presentation, and the second will be a scenario driven exercise that will facilitate a discussion of how the business processes will be used in commonly encountered operational situations. Sam Brinkley will employ several subject matter experts to assist him.

During the introduction and parting remarks, Superintendent Fuentes, LTC Rodgers, and Tim Connors will each, in their own way, reinforce "keeping the eye on the end result" - professional policing in the Homeland Security Era. As Ratcliffe clearly pointed out in the last seminar, the NJSP has too much at stake in terms of responsibility to "police for the moment, police for the media, or police for what has traditionally been measured (when that yardstick does not necessarily support the outputs and outcomes planned for). This seminar will set the strategic intelligence process as the integral component to intelligence-led policing the standard employed by the NJSP.

The top leaders in the Branch will meet with LTC Rodgers on Monday, 6 February for a professional discussion regarding the implementation of these business processes.
